We have received six applications for our three scholarships of \$250 for Butler County residents. The Scholarship Committee will review the applications and announce the winners of the scholarships at the July meeting.

We also are donating \$250 to the Tools for Schools foundation at Butler Tech, to be used to help fund tools for students enrolled in landscaping/horticulture students.

As a reminder we have \$600 set aside for funding Master Gardener's registration at the State Master Gardener's conference, with a maximum of \$100/year per applicant. Another \$400 is available for funding educational opportunities for members, with a maximum of \$100/applicant per year.



Farm Zone/Fair Committee Report by Marilyn Bowling

We held our organizational meeting on March 10 at the OSU Extension Office with ten Master Gardeners and two Interns in attendance. We started with an overview of previous years displays, particularly last year during COVID. After much discussion, we decided that adult education will be this year's prime focus with the theme "Grow Your Own Food – Everybody Can Do It." The focus will be on container growing, raised beds, grow boxes, pots, and various other containers. All ages, from early childhood to senior citizens, can be involved in container growing. We will show these various ways and areas in which to grow food.

We are excited to have a hydroponic tower for our use all week at the fair, borrowed from the West Chester Boys and Girls Club. A big thank you to Lynn and Robyn Glaser for securing this for our use at the fair. There will be pictures illustrating various spots for container gardening such as day care centers, schools, long term care facilities, and homes. Members of the committee have selected various themes to illustrate how to plant fruits and vegetables, including who, when, where, and why. In addition, the emotional benefits of raising fruits and vegetables will be illustrated.
